Tēnā koutou katoa,

It is our pleasure to present the Toi Foundation Annual Report for the 2025–26 financial year. He tau o te ako, te whakakotahitanga, me te whai hua. A year of learning, connection, and collective impact.

Our focus has remained on funding where the need is greatest, and on working alongside organisations, iwi, hapū, and community leaders who are shaping meaningful and enduring change across the rohe.

As a Foundation, we are always learning from the communities we serve. In January, we were privileged to host the Community Trusts Wānanga here in Ngāmotu New Plymouth, welcoming around 70 attendees from across Aotearoa to explore The Place of Te Tiriti in local communities in post-settlement Aotearoa.

The two-day gathering created space for kōrero, reflection, and shared understanding. It reinforced for us the importance of partnership, authenticity, and grounding our decisions in the histories, experiences, and aspirations of Taranaki iwi and communities.

Hosting this wānanga was an honour and a reminder of the collective responsibility we all carry in giving effect to Te Tiriti in practical, everyday ways.

Leadership and people

This year we acknowledged the retirement of Robin Brockie, who completed two full terms as a Trustee. Robin has made a significant contribution during his time with Toi Foundation, offering steady leadership and deep community insight. We thank him sincerely for his service.

We were pleased to welcome Emma Gardiner, who joined us on 30 January this year. Emma is an uri of Ngāruahinerangi and Ngāti Ruanui, and brings a rich blend of governance experience, strategic thinking, and a lifelong commitment to learning. Emma’s background across design, horticulture, iwi leadership, and community development adds valuable depth to our Board table, and we are delighted to have her with us.

Across our kaimahi, there has also been a continued focus on strengthening our internal systems, culture, and ways of working. We believe that our impact in the community and environment is only as strong as the people who help make it happen. This year we have embedded updated policies, improved internal processes, and strengthened communication across the organisation. These steps provide a foundation that supports our growth and ensures we remain responsive, accessible, and aligned with our values.

Our work across the region

Our four strategic focus areas continue to guide our approach. This report outlines the breadth of activity across Rangatiratanga, Child and Youth Wellbeing, Improved Environment, and Increased Access to Opportunities. Each area reflects different needs, yet all are deeply interconnected in building long-term community wellbeing.

Our environment work is expanding, connecting taiao and tangata for lasting regional resilience.

This year has seen a significant uplift in environment-focused investment and community action, with over \$5 million in grants supporting restoration, capability-building, climate initiatives, and circular economy efforts. This signals not only demand, but momentum.

This level of support reflects a region increasingly focused on environmental resilience, and a strong willingness among communities to work together to restore and protect our whenua and waters.

Our Child and Youth Wellbeing focus area continues to support the diverse needs of tamariki, rangatahi, and their whānau across the region. This year we have backed initiatives that strengthen parenting, improve access to education and learning, and create environments where young people can grow with confidence. Funding has supported school-based programmes, youth development activities, and facilities that provide safe, stable spaces for connection, creativity, and learning.

We have also continued to invest in events and community-led initiatives that celebrate young people and foster a sense of belonging.

Across Taranaki, organisations are working hard to remove barriers, support whānau, and create positive pathways for children and young people. Their efforts reflect the strength and care within our communities, and we are proud to walk alongside them.

Working together with our communities, Toi Foundation has strategically distributed funding across all fund types and throughout the region, investing in people, communities, and initiatives that create meaningful change in Taranaki.

Our funding is directed to where it’s needed most and where it will have the greatest impact.

When we back iwi-led aspirations, the aim is the same – meaningful, practical support that removes barriers, builds capability, and honours local leadership.

We have continued to spend time in South Taranaki where need remains high, and our community drop-in approach has supported better connection and visibility.

We are also seeing strong collaboration across iwi, hapū, councils, health providers, and community groups, which strengthens the region’s ability to respond to long-term social and environmental challenges.

Toitū Te Huatahi Community Hub - One Year On

Now in its first full year of operation, Toitū Te Huatahi has become a well-used and valued space for the region’s not-for-profit sector. Toitū Te Huatahi was created in response to a long-identified need for accessible, flexible, and low-cost community spaces where organisations can meet, plan, collaborate, and deliver programmes.

The past year has shown just how significant that need is. By the six-month mark alone, the Hub had supported 359 bookings from over a hundred different organisations, ranging from grassroots community groups to established service providers, iwi entities, and social sector partners. This strong utilisation has continued throughout the year, with regular repeat bookings indicating that many groups now rely on the hub as part of their day-to-day operations.

Toitū Te Huatahi has become a place where people come together to share ideas, develop capability, and strengthen the work they do for their communities. Feedback reflects appreciation of a welcoming, well-equipped space, with flexible operating hours, that reduces barriers to connection and enables more organisations to focus their time and resources on delivering impact.

As demand grows, the hub’s first year reinforces the importance of investing in shared community infrastructure.

TSB Heartland Bank Merger Proposal

On June 2nd, Toi Foundation Trustees announced a proposal for TSB and Heartland Bank to merge, with a sale consideration of \$620 million (made up of cash, debt, and equity).

Following this announcement two community consultation rounds have taken place, and robust discussions have been had across the region to understand what this proposal may enable for Toi Foundation and ultimately, the Taranaki community.

We appreciate the community’s engagement in the process to date. We have received a wide range of submissions and the community will be informed once a decision is made

Looking ahead

The year has been shaped by change, growth, and a deepening sense of collective purpose. We remain grounded in our commitment to fund where the need is greatest, honour relationships, and act in ways that reflect the aspirations of the people and communities we serve.

Our thanks go to our Trustees, our kaimahi, our community partners, and to Fisher Funds Management Ltd and TSB Bank Ltd, whose success continues to enable the work of the Foundation. Most importantly, we acknowledge the many individuals and organisations across Taranaki who are dedicated to strengthening their communities. This work is shared work, and it is a privilege to be part of it.

Each year, TSB and Fisher Funds pay dividends to the holding company. The holding company then pays dividends to Toi Foundation. These dividends enable the Foundation to complete its philanthropic work.

Therefore, if people bank with TSB and have their KiwiSaver with Fisher Funds, they contribute in a supportive and measurable way to our community.

Ngā Momo Pūtea • Our Fund Types

Our funding is designed to be flexible and responsive, meeting both immediate needs and long-term opportunities. Through strategic investment and collaboration, we help our communities bring ideas to life and enable change that matters.

We understand the significance and impact of our grants that increase access to opportunities and enhance wellbeing for our community. Ngā Kaupapa Matua • Our Focus Areas

INCREASED ACCESS TO OPPORTUNITIES

Strengthening communities, fostering belonging and providing experiences.

Through the Strengthening Community Fund, we increase people's ability to access and participate in opportunities that meet their needs and aspirations. At its core, the fund breaks down barriers and facilitates connection by supporting individuals to engage with a wide range of opportunities. By investing in skill-building, knowledge, facilities, events and programmes, the Foundation equips individuals and groups with the tools they need to flourish.

This funding reflects a commitment to inclusive, vibrant communities where people can thrive. A key focus is fostering belonging, inclusion and connection. By supporting collaborative efforts that bring people together, the Fund champions diversity, amplifies marginalised voices and strengthens cohesion and mutual support. The Foundation directs funding where need is greatest, creating spaces where everyone feels valued and able to contribute.

By increasing access to opportunities across Taranaki, the Foundation provides essential resources and nurtures a culture of empowerment, where every individual has the chance to pursue their passions and realise their potential within an inclusive community ecosystem.

ENHANCED CHILD AND YOUTH WELLBEING

Backing initiatives that improve wellbeing and opportunities.

Toi Foundation's focus on Child and Youth Wellbeing aims to give children and young people the best start to life. By supporting health, education, culture, identity and parental support, the Foundation helps remove systemic barriers for those most in need and builds stronger, more inclusive communities.

Our commitment goes beyond immediate impact. It is about creating a legacy of resilience, opportunity and wellbeing. Through strategic investment, we lay the groundwork for a future where every young person in Taranaki can thrive and contribute meaningfully.

The Foundation's Enhanced Child and Youth Wellbeing Strategy, informed by our community, guides our work and directs resources to the varied and often complex needs of young people. From education and healthcare to social inclusion and cultural enrichment, the impact reaches classrooms, communities and homes across Taranaki.

The ripple effects are tangible. Through mentorship, skill-building, events and access to vital resources, we equip young people with the tools they need to navigate challenges and seize opportunities with confidence.

IMPROVED ENVIRONMENT

Investing in sustainability, conservation and climate solutions.

Toi Foundation's Improved Environment focus area is dedicated to safeguarding the ecological integrity and resilience of Taranaki's natural landscapes. This includes protecting whenua, waterways and diverse ecosystems, supported by a strategic and proactive approach to environmental stewardship.

At its heart is a holistic view of conservation, recognising the connection between ecological health and community wellbeing. Through collaborative efforts, funding and investment, the Foundation helps cultivate a shared responsibility for caring for Taranaki's environment and biodiversity.

The Improved Environment Strategy highlights the need for resilience, acknowledging the increasing pressures of climate change and other environmental challenges. By supporting initiatives that strengthen the adaptive capacity of ecosystems and communities, the Foundation works toward a sustainable future where Taranaki's natural beauty and resources endure for generations.

With dedicated investment and partnerships, Toi Foundation aims to preserve the region's ecological richness and cultural heritage while acting as a catalyst for positive environmental change.

RANGATIRATANGA – EMPOWERING MĀORI ASPIRATION

Supporting kaupapa Māori-led initiatives and partnerships.

This strategic focus reflects Toi Foundation's commitment to Māori aspiration and self-determination across all levels of society. Grounded in the understanding that Māori ecosystems, including whānau, hapū, iwi and mātāwaka, are central to the prosperity of Taranaki and Aotearoa, this work centres on Taranakitanga (cultural identity), Taiao (environment and guardianship), Mātauranga (knowledge and education), and Oranga (social and economic wellbeing).

At its core is the pursuit of equitable opportunities and relationships that empower Māori communities. Through active engagement with Māori stakeholders and partners, the Foundation supports collaborations that honour partnership and reciprocity.

This focus works to dismantle systemic barriers to social, cultural and economic inclusion, creating conditions where Māori aspiration can flourish and where clear pathways for empowerment and advancement are strengthened.

Grounded in rangatiratanga – Māori authority and self-determination – this focus represents a commitment to a future in which Māori communities thrive as vibrant, self-determined contributors to the fabric of Taranaki.



Supporting one of Taranaki's fastest growing cultural festivals

The New Plymouth Malayalee Association (NPMA) is strengthening cultural connection and community pride, with a vibrant celebration for hundreds of families across Taranaki.

NPMA was formed in 2014, when only a few Malayalee families lived in Taranaki. Today, with around 220 families, the community continues to grow, and NPMA plays a central role in preserving culture and creating a sense of belonging.

"Malayalee refers to people who speak Malayalam, one of India's 22 official languages. We come from Kerala, a state of 35 million people. Our community has a long history of travelling and a strong tradition of nursing, both in India and around the world, including here in Aotearoa," said Manoj Chakko, NPMA President.

Each year NPMA hosts Onam, a month-long harvest festival marking the homecoming of the mythical King Mahabali. The celebration brings people together through dance, music, sport, and a shared feast. In its early years, Taranaki's Onam events were small and run on limited resources, often relying entirely on volunteers.

In August 2025, support from Toi Foundation allowed NPMA to deliver a celebration that reflected the scale and energy of its growing community.

"We did a lot of things differently this time. We hired a professional sound system and engineer, and had beautiful lighting for the dance performances," said Manoj.

"In previous years our committee ran everything, which meant many of us missed the event. With the grant, we could bring in help so more of our members could actually participate."

More than 550 people attended the celebration.

"It began with the Chenda drums, followed by traditional dance and musical performances across all age groups, and a feast we had to run over three sittings. After the prize-giving we finished with a tug of war, which is another Onam tradition," he said.

Manoj said the support made a meaningful difference.

"Thanks to Toi Foundation we weren't stressed, even though it was such a big event. We knew we had the resources to deliver it well."

For NPMA, the expanded celebration highlights the strength and vibrancy of the Malayalee community in Taranaki, and its commitment to sharing culture, connection, and joy with the region.



Turning Taranaki scraps into soil

Sustainable Taranaki works alongside schools, businesses and community groups to encourage practical sustainability and support a thriving environment for future generations. Their latest pilot, Green Loop, is taking that vision a step further by rethinking how Taranaki deals with its food waste.

For years, most of the region's green waste has been trucked out of Taranaki, costing money, increasing emissions, and improving someone else's soil instead of our own. Yet interest from farmers, growers and businesses to keep their waste local has been strong for some time.

"Green Loop has been set up as a self-sustaining social enterprise. We collect food waste and turn it into healthy, microbially dense soil using a fermenting system called Bokashi," said Mieke Verschoor, Organic Projects Manager.

The initiative links businesses, schools, retirement homes and farmers in a simple circular system. Waste is collected from participating organisations and delivered to community gardens and farms, where the Johnson Su static composting system converts it into nutrient rich compost with no turning required.

"Starting with five businesses, Green Loop is auditing their waste and setting them up with Bokashi bins layered with mulch and biochar. They add food scraps and zing to ferment, and we collect and replace the bins regularly," said Mieke.

Modelled on Auckland's successful City to Farm initiative, Green Loop has strong backing from Taranaki Regenerative Agriculture, TRC, WISE, Venture Taranaki, Taranaki Catchment Communities, NPDC and other partners.

Toi Foundation's \$60,000 Innovation Fund grant has been pivotal.

"The grant meant we could buy supplies in bulk, recruit businesses and farmers, secure better deals, and move quickly with confidence," said Joe Turton, Operations Team Leader.

Enthusiasm is growing. Organisations are keen to own their waste, improve sustainability and help regenerate soils depleted by agricultural activity. Joe also sees a future role for households contributing to community composting sites.

"While big cities have composting plants or biogas facilities, many smaller regions still truck food waste to landfill. Green Loop aims to change that," said Joe. "We are building a blueprint, sharing everything including our mistakes, so other provinces can adapt the model. That is only possible thanks to the confidence Toi has given us."

For Taranaki, Green Loop offers a practical local solution that improves soils, strengthens community partnerships, reduces emissions, and keeps value here at home.



Restoring the health of our waterways

Taranaki Catchment Communities (TCC) is a grassroots organisation bringing farmers, growers, and local groups together to protect and restore the region's freshwater. With Toi Foundation support, TCC is strengthening data, capability, and on-the-ground action across one of Aotearoa's largest catchment areas.

"TCC directly supports landowners, brings people together, and ensures the collaboration and engagement essential for effective catchment management," said Paul Turner, TCC Project Manager.

As the umbrella organisation for local groups, TCC focuses on improving freshwater health, boosting biodiversity, and promoting sustainable land use.

Each catchment's needs differ, given Taranaki's varied landscape. TCC secures funding, manages budgets, and ensures projects align with regional goals.

"A big part of our current work is collecting data to build a baseline. It helps us understand what's needed and measure the impact of our work," said Paul.

TCC initially operated with MPI funding, which was restricted to education. That limited its ability to implement practical projects.

"Since Toi Foundation came on board, we've been able to put a range of freshwater projects into action," said Paul.

Using 3D LiDAR maps from the Taranaki Regional Council, TCC has been modelling water flow and flood behaviour, identifying priority areas for effluent management and interventions that prevent chemicals and sediment entering waterways. A new digital portal will soon make these maps accessible to farmers.

Other projects include expanding water-quality monitoring beyond the current 47 sites, improving fish passage, and working alongside community partners.

"In another project, we collaborated with Massey University to build a bioreactor that filters water through wood chips. It's cheap, effective, and significantly reduces nitrogen flowing into waterways."

With 600 members already involved, TCC aims to grow its reach across rural and urban catchments.

"We're all about practical, effective, and culturally appropriate solutions, creating a foundation for being good stewards of the land."



Paddling to silver at Va'a World Champs

Waka ama – or outrigger canoeing – is a traditional sport in New Zealand. Internationally, it's known as Va'a and, while outrigger canoes have always been big in the Pacific, it's now a fast-growing sport here and worldwide.

"It's a really accessible sport. There are two main waka ama clubs in Taranaki and you can be big, small, old, young – everybody can go down and paddle, so it's an awesome sport to be part of," said Anne Cairns, who captained the New Zealand team at the Ocean-Going World Championships in Brazil this year and also raced at the Va'a Sprint Championships in Hawaii in 2024.

Anne applied for Toi Foundation funding to assist with costs to the August event.

"We want to do all these events, but the reality is we can't because of time off work and the costs involved. But it's a big honour to be in the team, let alone captain, so I really wanted to do this one."

The race took participants 12km along the coast into the wind and back again.

"Our team is really strong in the surf, so the plan was not to push for the front in the first half to keep our energy for coming back. It was huge, choppy, rough water, and at one stage we were lying sixth, which freaked me out a bit," said Anne.

"We got to the turning point and that's when we really started pushing to surf, picking off the teams one by one. The Australians were too far ahead, but we pulled into second place with about 5km to go and then had to hold on." "We paddled really strongly, and we're super satisfied that our race plan came together."

"Getting this grant relieved the stress of the financial side because one of the biggest worries is that you'll put yourself in a hole if you overspend what you and your whānau can actually manage."

"It's something I'll always treasure, being part of something like that and winning a medal for your country."



Growing kaitiaki in Taranaki

Te Ara Taiao is a Sustainable Taranaki programme that works alongside kura, hapū, and community partners to create learning experiences rooted in place, tikanga, and environmental practice.

"We work with Year 7-10 students in a wide range of kaupapa, from native planting and river restoration to traditional weaving, water monitoring, storytelling, and creative expression. One key focus is intergenerational learning, where tohunga and kaumātua share their mātauranga with the next generation," said Tane Manukonga, Project Lead.

"The name Te Ara Taiao was gifted to us by a local kaumātua. Ara means path and Taiao is environment, so it means the environmental pathway," said Jane Bowden Dobson, Co-Lead.

"Our programmes are based on a seasonal calendar. Right now, we're planting and working to protect seabird habitats. The kids are learning how to look after their habitats, getting their whānau involved and creating artwork for new signs."

Initially, Te Ara Taiao received DOC funding but found it hard to meet the growing demand from schools and whānau.

"Most of our team worked well beyond their paid hours, but still we struggled and found it hard to plan long-term or expand without stable support," said Tane

Toi Foundation funding has been a game changer for Te Ara Taiao, helping six kaimahi deliver the programme to over 200 Taranaki students this year.

"It allowed us to retain a solid delivery team and maintain our biodiversity outcomes. Most importantly, it gave us breathing space to plan strategically, build a strong foundation and shift from growth mode into a more sustainable space," said Tane.

Altogether, more than 500 people have engaged with Te Ara Taiao activities, deepening connection, cultural knowledge and environmental action across Taranaki.

"Toi Foundation's support has allowed us to grow something meaningful, grounded in both mātauranga and action. We're incredibly grateful to be able to do this mahi with our people, in our place, for future generations."



Ōpunakē Loop Trail delivers views and value

Formed from a 2020 Lions project, the Ōpunakē Loop Trail Trust links smaller tracks into a 7km loop around Ōpunakē, promoting local wellbeing and drawing visitors to the area.

"It's a diverse trail with coastline, a lake, bush, forest, farmland, parks, gardens, and the historic Te Namu Pā," said Trust Chair Brian Gasson. "You get great views and a real mix of scenery."

Maintaining and developing such a diverse trail requires time and effort from many Ōpunakē volunteers.

"We tap into community groups who donate time and labour into developing the areas along the track, planting, maintaining, and so on. However, the biggest challenge is funding and labour for major works like bridges and flood repair," said Brian.

In 2022, Toi Foundation helped the Trust fund flood damage repairs and restoration after a major washout, and later Toi funding enabled urgent safety works on a steep gravel slope. Now, \$4k from Toi has provided materials for a cooperative venture with students from Ōpunakē High School's Tiny Homes Project.

"We asked them to build a bird hide by the lake. It'll shelter hikers and give birdwatchers a spot to observe wildlife. We've also spoken to the local ornithological society about putting up bird info boards," said Brian.

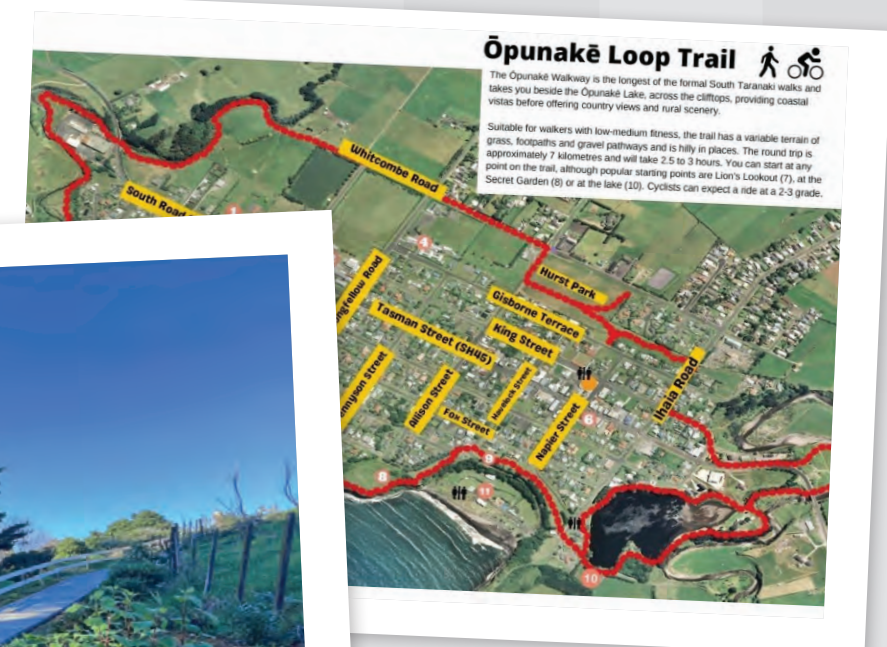
"The high school has also put in hundreds of hours planting natives on scrub land and helping with maintenance. There's real community buy-in, especially from the kids."

The Ōpunakē Loop Trail has attracted thousands of people in recent years.

"Locals use it for fitness, cycling, walking and running. We get walking groups, events and out-of-town visitors all the time. They often stop to chat and are always full of praise. It's a real asset, they love it."

"And when people visit Ōpunakē for the trail, they grab a coffee or refuel, so it brings wider economic and social benefits."

"We're really grateful to Toi Foundation, our major funder. Without their support and other sponsors, the Trail wouldn't be what it is today."

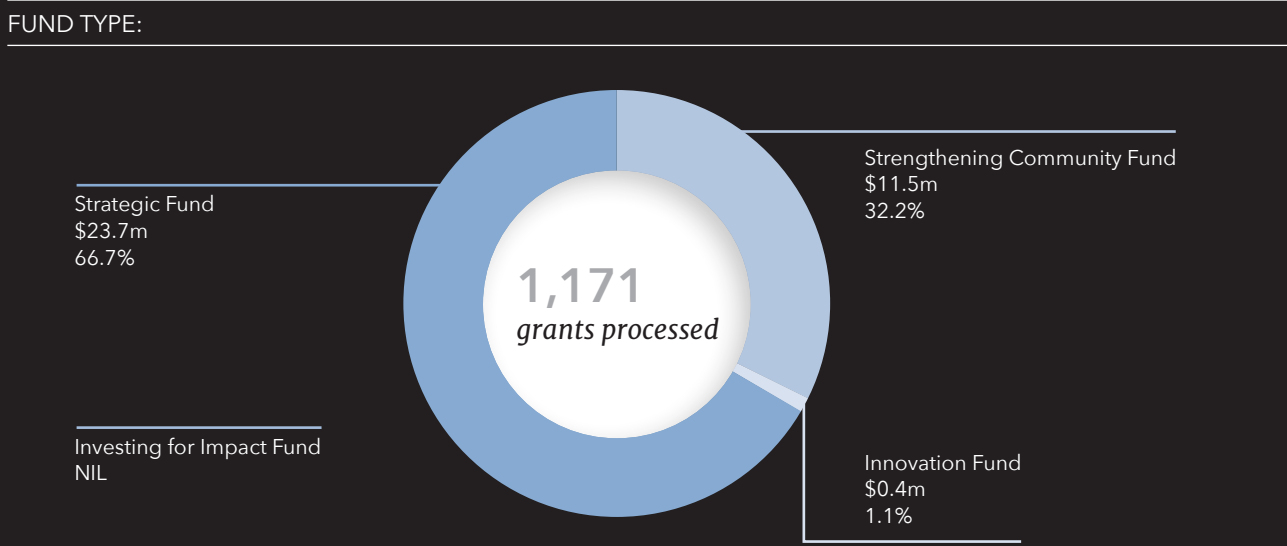
FINANCIAL YEAR 2026

In the 2025/26 financial year, Toi Foundation distributed \$35.6 million in funding support across Taranaki. That's around \$282 for every person in our region. We supported 1,171 funding applications - helping a wide range of people, groups, and projects to thrive.

It's worth noting that how we report funding can sometimes paint an incomplete picture. Some of our larger, longer-term grants are treated as future commitments. This means they aren't included in this year's financial total, even though the decisions and intent to support these initiatives have been made. In FY26, this includes Te Pou Tiringa Inc (\$0.35 million). If we included this grant, our total grant making would exceed \$35.9 million - a reflection of our ongoing commitment to backing the people, places, and projects of Taranaki. It's technical detail, we know – but it matters.

What matters most is that support is reaching where it's needed - and thanks to strong returns from TSB Bank Ltd and Fisher Funds Management Ltd, we continue to provide high levels of annual grant making that deliver real impact across our region. As always, our focus remains on backing the people of Taranaki - empowering communities to lead the change they want to see.

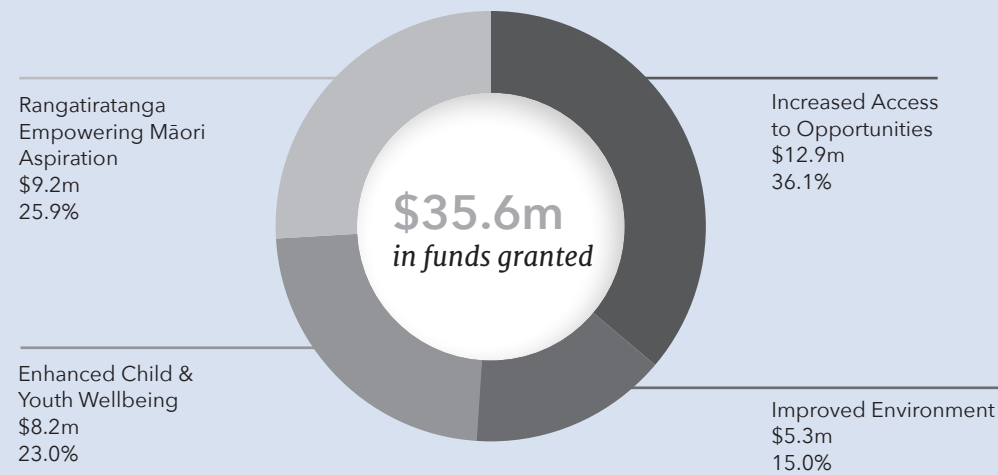
DATA COMMENTARY:

1,171 grants totalling \$35.6m were processed across the Strengthening Community, Strategic, and Innovation Funds. This amount includes multi-year amounts from previous years that were paid in FY26. This represents a 35.1% increase from the previous financial year FY25, during which \$26.4m (1,203 grants) were distributed. There were no Investing for Impact investments in FY26.

The Statement of Service Performance (SSP) graphs reflect a total of \$35.6m in grants approved by the Toi Foundation for the fiscal year ending 31 March 2026. However, after accounting for \$0.4m in withdrawn and refunded grants from previous years, the net amount disclosed in the financial statements is \$35.2m. This reconciliation is detailed in the Toi Foundation Summary Financial Statements.

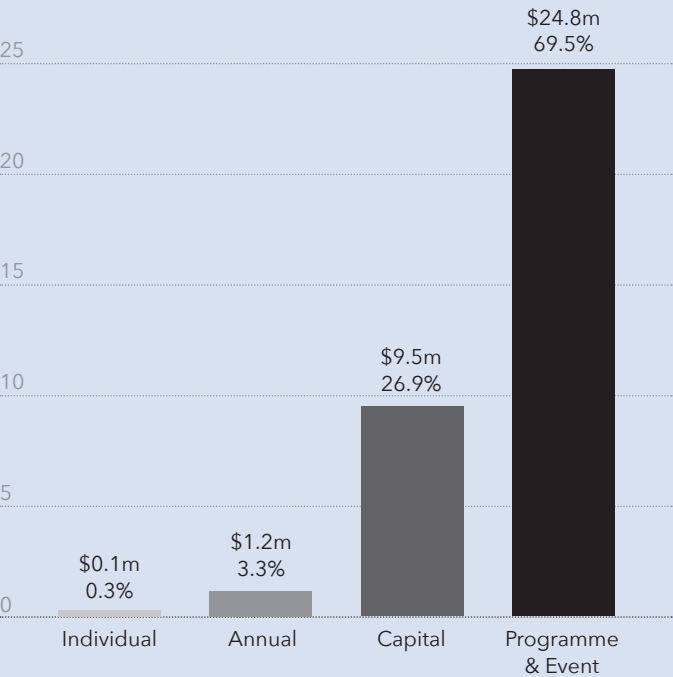

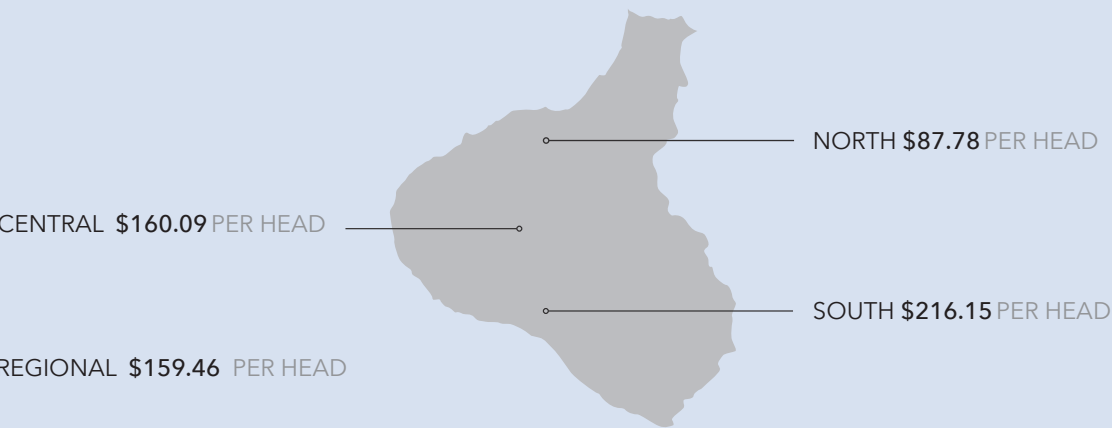

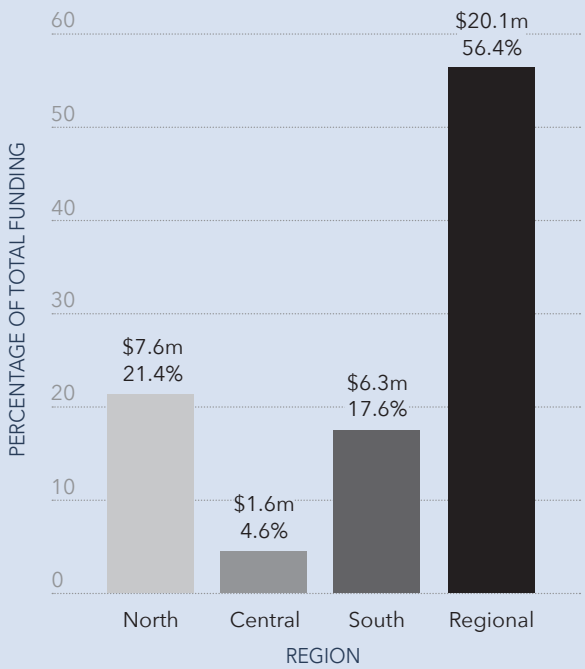

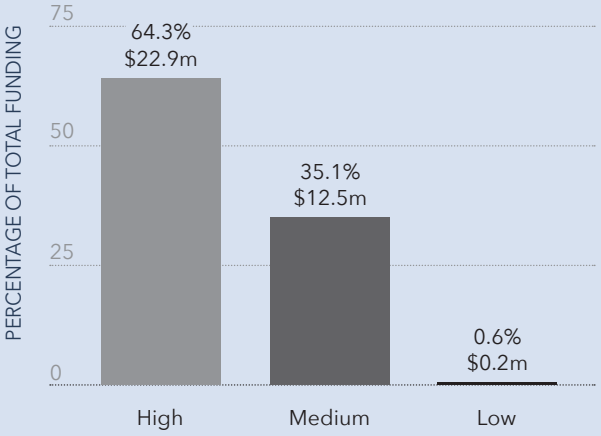

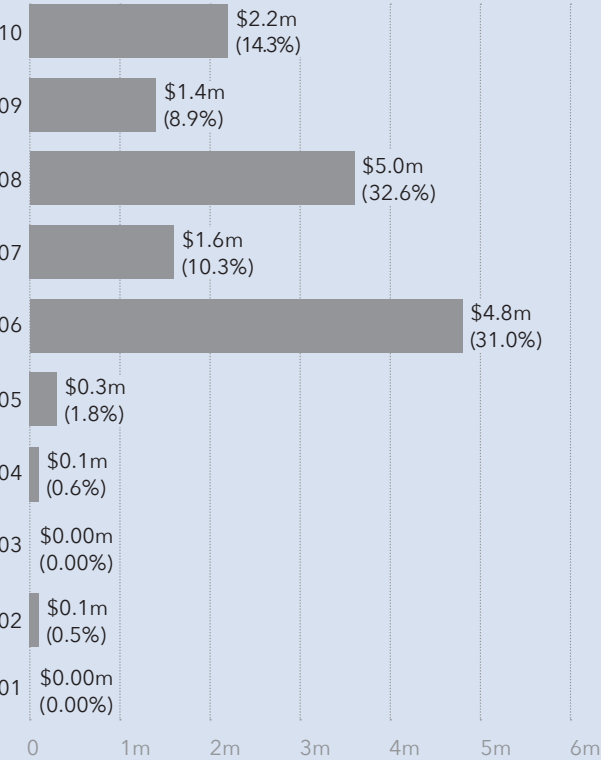

These summary financial statements have been prepared in compliance with PBE FRS 43: Summary Financial Statements. These summary financial statements have been extracted from the full financial statements and do not include all the disclosures provided in the full financial statements and do not provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial statements. The full financial statements were authorised for issue by the Trustees on 30th July 2026. The full financial statements have been audited with an unmodified audit opinion issued on those financial statements for both periods the financial statements cover.

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars. All numbers are rounded to the nearest dollar.

The Foundation holds various term investments with TSB Bank Limited. Toi Foundation Holdings Limited also owns 100% of shares in Toi Foundation Investments Limited. Toi Foundation Investments Limited has an 66.01% investment in the subsidiary company FFML TopCo Limited. FFML TopCo Limited holds 100% of the ownership of FFML Holdco Limited. FFML Holdco Limited holds 100% of the shares of Fisher Funds Management Limited. Toi Foundation Holdings Limited, Toi Foundation Investments Limited and FFML TopCo Limited’s principal place of business is in New Zealand.
